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The status of the service delivery system

- Lack of accommodation and increasing number of slums and homelessness especially in areas nearer to centres of economic activity
 - Poor access to potable water and poor access to safe sanitation
 - Low generation and limited access to grid electricity
 - Increasing quantities of uncollected waste arising from little or non-existent waste collection services
 - Poor and deteriorating schooling environment
 - Unreliable and ailing health delivery system
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Effects of poor services delivery to the corporate sector

- Increased production costs e.g water tanking or running a generator.
- Loss of production time due to illness and or workers attending to their family sickness .
- Loss of resources as workers look for distant schools for their children (even own schooling).
- Loss of expertise as people seek opportunities in areas with better services (cities/countries)
- Ineffective workers who are tired by the time they get to the work place after looking for water, transport, e.tc

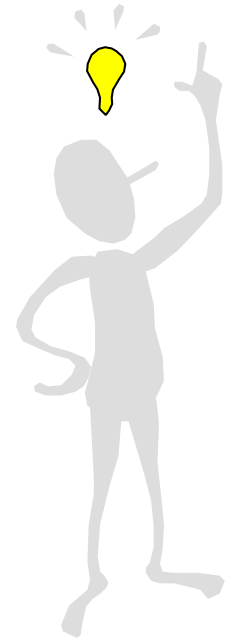


Dilemma for corporate sector involvement in service delivery

- Weak/non existent partnership frameworks in service delivery
 - Absence of enabling policies that promote participation in service delivery
 - The miss-match with stakeholders' priorities and core business activities
 - No perceived business sense in service delivery
 - No reliable data on access and coverage of municipal infrastructure services for effective planning and financing.

The steps to progress

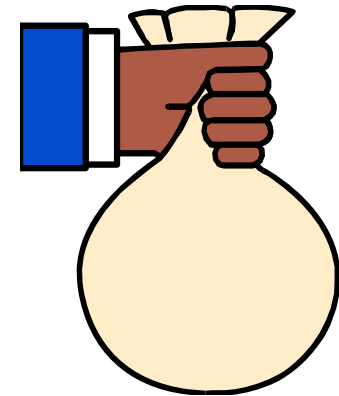
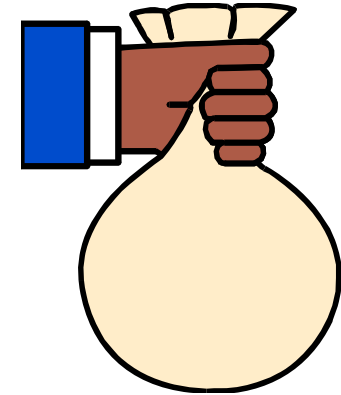


Creation of a common vision-through:

 - increases the level of collective ownership
 - enhances accountability mechanisms
 - identifies the resource envelopes
